## Stage 2 project

It is fantastic that we have secured the funding for the second stage of the upgrade. This is an achievement for Governing Councils past and present who have relentlessly advocated for the project. The question is when?

- 2023 – Project Manager, and architect appointed.
- 2024 – plans finalised, and builders appointed.
- 2025/6 - build with a completion date mid 2026.

The build is located on the old tennis court area and will not disrupt the school during the build. Once completed the administration block and library will be demolished. The grounds shed and entrance will be relocated to create safer traffic flow. The draft plan will be placed in the Front Office and Library – please note these are not final plans.

## Meningie Area School Pinocchio the Musical Production

On Tuesday 27th and Wednesday 28th July, students, staff, parents, caregivers, and community members braved the cool, June evening weather to attend the Meningie Area School production of Pinocchio the Musical. This production had been in the making since the beginning of Semester 1, 2023.

Electricity was in the air as performers hurried around to get into their carefully planned, hand-made, costumes and adorn themselves with exaggerated stage makeup. Meanwhile, cheerful parents, caregivers, and community members streamed through the gym foyer, transformed into a magical underwater world, complete with turquoise streamers from the ceiling and ambient fairy lights. Anticipation was at its peak with the audience seated in the gym-now-theatre, minutes from the long-awaited event.

Year 7-9 actors did not disappoint. They took to the stage with gusto, nailing most of their lines, with some improvisation giving comedic relief to the audience. Of note were Christian Retsas and Serenity Booth, who each took on the main acting role, Pinocchio, on consecutive nights. Both did a mammoth job and performed incredibly well!

Staging and props infused the final magic into the whole production. This included not only an impressive array of colourfully painted, paper mâché and cardboard props, backdrops and signs, but an interactive video of actors playing Pinocchio and Geppetto inside a giant whale! The Year 7-9 stage "ninjas", who carried items on and off the stage during scene transitions, handled the high-pressure, backstage environment with enthusiasm.

Overall, the production was a huge success, thanks to all MAS students and staff, including Sarah Wilson, Anne Wright, Denice Mason, Amelia Nakone, and Bree Edwards. What a fantastic opportunity to come together as a school community and celebrate the arts through the reproduction of a much-loved story that still has significance today.

The Premier's *be active* Challenge is a physical activity program introduced by the Premier in 2007 to:

The Challenge requires students to do at least 60 minutes of physical activity on at least 5 days of the week for at least 4 weeks between the beginning of the school year and late September.

After 4 weeks of daily physical activity, students will be rewarded with a medal. After 10 weeks of daily physical activity, schools are in the running to win \$1000 to promote physical activity.

## Is your teenager struggling to attend school due to anxiety, depression or emotional distress?

Be among the first to trial a new online parenting program designed to support parents of teens struggling with school attendance.

Researchers from Monash University and Deakin University are offering parents a **FREE online parenting program** designed to support parents of teenagers who have **difficulty attending school due to anxiety, depression, or emotional distress** (sometimes called 'school refusal', 'school can't', or 'school phobia'). The program is being offered as part of a research trial.

### What's included in the program?

- A parenting self-assessment tool with personalised feedback
- Up to 13 online modules with practical strategies to support your teen's mental health and school attendance
- Complete weekly modules and work towards goals

### Who can take part?

You may be eligible to participate if:

- you are the parent or guardian of a teenager aged 12-18
- live in Australia
- can read, write, and speak in English,
- have regular access to the Internet.

The program is not recommended as a sole source of support for young people experiencing school refusal. We recommend seeking professional support from a mental health or education professional alongside completing this program. Although all parents are able to take part, please also note that the program content is not tailored for parents of teenagers with Autism Spectrum Disorder or intellectual disability.

### What else is involved?

To help us evaluate the program, we'll ask you to complete two online surveys about your parenting and your teen's mental health. We may also invite you to complete an interview about your experience with the program. You'll receive a \$20 gift voucher after completing the second survey, and an additional \$20 gift voucher if you complete an interview.
