Reconciliation Week

Last week we celebrated Reconciliation Week and students undertook a range of activities to learn about the events recognized during Reconciliation Week (Sorry Day, 1967 referendum and Mabo Day) and the process of reconciliation. Some student work is in this newsletter.

The year 9/10 class hosted the assembly and one of the topics is why we do "welcome to country" Joy Murphy Wandin (Wurundjeri Elder) says it is "a very important way of giving Aboriginal people back their place in society, and an opportunity for us to say, 'We are real, we are here, and today we welcome you to our land'...It's paying respect in a formal sense, and following the traditional custom in a symbolic way".

They finished the presentation with a very entertaining tribute to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander footballers. The reception class shared their learning on the Aboriginal flag and the Torres Strait Islander flag with the Year 1/2 class sharing their understanding of reconciliation.

All our students demonstrate commitment to reconciliation, to learning and understanding the past to work towards a tolerant and fairer future with optimism.

Canberra - 2 weeks to go!

With the 4 day break it is a great time for students to organize their list for what to pack and get ready. Students were given some reminders at an assembly this week:

Medication:

- if your teen takes medication please ensure you have a in date medication agreement and pack it in a zip lock bag with enough mediation for the trip.
- non prescription medication. Staff are not medically trained and cannot give any medication including Panadol and travel tablets. If you think your teen needs non-prescription medication, please go to the pharmacy and ask them to label it with your child's name and what can be given. This will be held by staff and given out as per the pharmacy instructions.
- If your child gets travel sick, please organize some medication.
- If your child has not had a flu shot, please consider getting one.

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Clothing:

- Students must take their school jumper and T-shirt as they will be required to wear this for our daily outings. They can wear comfortable clothing on the bus and around the accommodation (we will recommend they change when they return to the accommodation to try to keep it clean.
- Warm layers skivvies/thermals the maximum temperature in Canberra is about 9-10°C at the moment. Bring a warm jacket – if students don't have a jacket we have some school ones that can be loaned. Students will receive a free beanie with "MAS Canberra 2024" as a memento of the trip.

Phones and smart watches

- Students can have phones on the bus but are asked not to use social media. At all other times students will need to turn phone off and put in YONDR pouch. Phones will be unlocked for 1 hour in the evening for students to call home etc. If students don't have a phone, they can use the school phone.
- Watches are not to remain connected to phones, if students use watches to communicate, they will be required to put their watch in a YONDR pouch.

Stage 2 Development Administration and School Community Library

It is nearly a year ago that the government announced \$9,7 million for the second stage of the school redevelopment. In March Troppo Architects were awarded the contract, Troppo also worked





on Stage 1. We are now in the design phase which takes the concept plans, to detailed plans. They then need to go through costings and approved. We had our start up meeting on 2 May and are getting into the nitty gritty planning. As a Department for Education site we don't have free rein, but have to work to the departments specifications on the types of spaces and the size of the spaces. This phase of design and costings will take a few months and the plan is to go to tender for the builder early in 2025. The end date for the project is March 2026.

Part of the project is a large landscaping project for the area left when the existing library is removed. There will be a large central space which will provide a space for outdoor learning, events and general play space. Landscape architect Lyndon Slavin has met with students, staff and community to discuss ideas. A consultation was also held at Raukkan to discuss cultural aspects of the design. Thank you to all who contributed to the conversations.
