The new South Australian Curriculum R-10 has been launched. This curriculum still uses the Australian Curriculum R-10 but brings in capabilities and dispositions as attributes of successful learners. Teachers will be familiarising themselves with the new curriculum in 2024 and starting to program using the curriculum in 2025 with full adoption by 2027. Teachers will have the opportunity to provide feedback to DfE which will shape the final curriculum. The graphic below shows the connections between knowledge, dispositions and capabilities and what learners know, can do, and become.

Term 3 Learning foci:

In junior primary we are working with the Literacy Guarantee Unit to implement the scope and sequence for phonics. We have a coach Deb Tarca working with 2 teachers - Rhian Griffith and Ben Scharfbillig to embed explicit phonics teaching in their literacy block. Deb spent 20 years as an early year's teacher she is an excellent resource for Meningie Area School. We will

have access to the coach for 3 years and will work up through the primary years over this time. In years 4-6 spelling and morphology are the focus to develop vocabulary and understanding of words. Data will be collected to evaluate the teaching strategies and monitor student progress.

EIF – Exploring identity and futures – Year 9/10 class.

This subject replaces the Personal Learning Plan and has some similarities but is a lot broader and aims to help students develop aspiration for who they want to become rather than just focus on careers. There is still the opportunity to explore careers and the class do want to complete work experience. We will provide dates and details soon. Students will explore their identity, careers and complete a personal project. The subject aims to develop student agency which can be described as "participating in active learning rather than passive learning and trying to work things out for yourself. It is also being willing to experiment, learn fail and then try again" (OECD 2020-2023 Strategic Plan). The subject follows on well from Enterprise in semester 1 where students have been working on developing capabilities and entrepreneurial skills. We look forward to welcoming our families and community to the Enterprise Expo to showcase this work.

Part of the exploration will include learning about the SACE and planning pathways which will provide information for our 2025 senior courses. We will be providing information and have an information session towards the end of the term for Year 10's going into Year 11. Current Year 11's are on individual pathways and 2025 programs will occur in individual meetings.

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What would you tell younger students about your experience on the Canberra Camp?


- It was lots of fun and the food was good.

Questacon was so much fun!



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NAIDOC WEEK

On the last week of Term 2 Meningie Area School Celebrated NAIDOC Week along with the Coorong District Council and Community.

NAIDOC Week Celebrations are held across Australia in the first week of July each year, to celebrate and recognize the History, Culture and Achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples. NAIDOC Week is an opportunity for all Australians to learn about first Nations cultures and histories and participate in celebrations of the oldest, continuous living cultures on earth. Every year there is a theme, this year's theme was "Keep the Fire Burning, Blak, Loud and Proud".

The celebrations started off with a beautiful Welcome to Country read entirely in the local Ngarrindjeri Language by Mya Kartinyeri and then a Flag raising was held at our newly installed flagpoles on the hill at the front of the school. Students spoke about the meanings of the 3 Flags, the Australian Flag, the Aboriginal Flag and the Torres Strait Islander Flag. Everyone then assembled into the school hall where Councillor Mrs Sharon Bland read the Acknowledgment of Country. This was followed by a dance performance by the Ritjurukkar Dance Group and then an





Instructor Rita Lindsay. Following the workshop, students, staff and community were invited to particiate in a variety of activities which were set up in the hall, including feather flowers demonstrated by Isobell Koolmatie, ACEO and traditional Ngarrindjeri weaving shared by Deb Rankine SSO and Desinty Rankine. There was also some craft activities set up including the creation of large artworks of our building names, Thukabi, Pinyali and Kondoli. Following on from the success of the Living Libraries at last years NAIDOC celebration, this year we were extremely fortunate to have Ngarrindjeri Elders, Aunty Betty Sumner, Uncle Derek Gollan and Uncle Eric (Wally) Richards who shared their life stories and journey to the students, staff and Community. We thank them for their generous time

and very personalised sharing. The day was finished off with a delicious BBQ Lunch cooked by the Meningie Lions Club with help from Ashley (Frog) Mason who cooked the delicious Kanmeri (Coorong Mullet).

There were Short Films screened at lunchtimes during NAIDOC week on Ngarrindjeri Culture.





That night some of us went to sport practice and some stayed at school and played a variety of games and again cooked our own tea.


On Friday we spent another day doing activities and learning together.

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
