
conducted a debate with students taking positions for and against the proposal to "Make it illegal to set homework for school students"


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### **Congratulations Brendan**

### **EMU Crossings**

What do they look like? Emu crossings have white road markings and red "CHILDREN CROSSING" flags displayed on red and white posts. Our crossing is located on North Terrace.

<u>How do they work?</u> Emu crossings are part time crossings. They are operational when the "CHILDREN CROSSING" flags are displayed.

What should pedestrians and bike riders do? Whenever people cross the road, even if the flags are displayed, they should still use the STOP LOOK LISTEN THINK procedure to check that vehicles have stopped and drivers have seen them before they walk or ride across. When the flags are not up pedestrians and bike riders and bike riders do not have priority. They should use the STOP LOOK LISTEN THINK procedure to cross the road.

What should parents do? Encourage your child to cross the road at the crossing between the flags and stop, look, listen and think as above.

What should drivers do? As emu crossings are in school zones, drivers must travel at no more than 25 km/hr at any time when children are present on the road or footpath. Drivers must stop for anyone using the crossing or about to use the crossing when flags are displayed. The school staff would appreciate if drivers make eye contact with the staff member on duty to check it's safe to proceed through the crossing.

On the 14<sup>th</sup> of September, 2023, 4 students from the year 5/6 class went to Meldanda, Cambrai. Antonia, Sarayah, Tayla and Tylan went to YEL. They learnt about sustainable water and how its so important for our eco system. We got split into 3 different groups of kids from different places we have never met before. We first went to Mermaid Lake to learn about different things Landscape SA focus on and study.

We went back to learn about water bugs that live in the Lakes around the area. We then tested the PH level of different water sources from different areas. Some results were different, and they varied between 1-14 PH levels. We then went over to try a new activity at the campsite. We all got a card with different things that need water. First, we brainstormed different things that need water in the environment and shared 2 each with the group. We then got 2 jugs and had to pour how much we thought we needed and had to save more for the other people down the line. We

tried 2 times, the first was very hard to distribute because people were

greedy and took more but didn't notice it. The second time we distributed the water a lot better with the thought of others in our minds.

Meldanda shouted us a free sausage sizzle and a zooper doper each. We played with the other students from different schools. After lunch we went inside and learnt where water goes and how rain works. There were many questions as to why the water goes deep in the ground and comes back up. We talked to Stu, the water scientist and then went for our last task for the day. We had a scavenger hunt to find different things around the nature reserve. We had to find different things around the farm to be able to go inside the to the cool, refreshing room. We then started our journey home and got back nearly 2 hours later. We had an amazing day and wish we could do it again!
