

### Year 5/6 - Term 4 Science/HASS

you place it into a machine, and it repairs it. – Amber R

During term 4 the year 5/6 class has been doing a brand-new program in Science/HASS created Beacon Education, the students have been learning about sustainability development goals that are published by the United Nations. Students learn about their world, the problems with their world and how they can fix these problems. The interesting thing about this program is how the students learn about it, through the program they can use Virtual/Augmented reality and merge cubes thus far to visualise their learning about sustainability by creating "future smart cities" and future gadgets that can fix a current waste problem that we



have. Below are some of the thoughts from students in the class about the program:

Beacon is a program including VR headsets and mobile phones with programs in them. In this program we have been learning more about sustainability and how it is important to leave resources for our future generations. With our headsets, we had a look at what a smart city looked like and learned more about sustainability and how to understand it better. On one of the programs called Tinker Cad we made a gadget that can reuse wasted items. I made a Tupper ware re user that when the containers get broken,

This term we have been using a program called beacon. We got to use VR, we also learnt about sustainability, world gadgets and what the future world would look like. In the VR we got to look at smart cities and then creating our own smart city on Co Spaces. We used online programs called tinker cad and co spaces where we created our smart cities and made our own world gadget. We also created our own merge cubes then used the real merge cubes and used a phone, this is called augmented reality. – Hugo S

In our lessons we've been learning about different Sustainable Development Goals and how to live sustainably and what our future will look like. We have also used VR headsets too look at smart cities and to learn more about being sustainable. – Jasmine W



In this program we have been learning how to live sustainably so that important things in the world can live for a long time, so our future generations have the resources they need. We also used VR headsets to see what a smart city is and to learn more about sustainability. After we used the VR headsets, we created out own smart cities on Cospaces. — Levi M

In the coming weeks students will also explore robotics and learn how they might be a part of their future world.
