### Welcome 2026 New Staff





### **Year 8 - 10 STEM**

In STEM this term we are looking at biotechnology. We have been investigating DNA and its structure. To do this, we created three different model representations, one using origami, one was cut and stick, and the other used food. The origami model, showed the supercoil really well and how the strands can be compacted, but it was difficult to see the deoxyribose and the double helix structure.





The cut and stick model showed the deoxyribose strands really well,

but didn't create the helical structure very well. The edible model showed the parts really well and was useful because we had to match up the different bases ourselves. It didn't have the helix, although it was good to eat afterwards. All of the models had their good features and their not so good features.

### Ngarrindjeri language presented at international and state conferences

I have recently had the opportunity to present Ngarrindjeri language work at several conferences. I have also participated in presentations for key stakeholders, including First Languages Australia. The success of the Meningie Area School, Ngarrindjeri Language Program and student work were highlighted within the presentations.

I was invited by the Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority (ACARA) to co-present at the 25<sup>th</sup> AFMLTA International Languages Conference in Adelaide, 11th – 13<sup>th</sup> of July 2025. AFMLTA is the Australian Federation of Modern Language Teachers Associations. I co-presented with Alison von Dietze, Curriculum specialist, Languages, ACARA for the Version 9.0 Framework for Aboriginal Languages and Torres Strait Islander Languages. As a curriculum writer, I contributed to the Australian Curriculum, Assessment and Reporting Authority Review of Version 9.0 Framework for Aboriginal Languages and Torres Strait Islander Languages.

From Tuesday 26<sup>th</sup>-Friday 29<sup>th</sup> of August, I attended and presented at the International PULiiMA 2025 Indigenous Languages & Technology Conference in Darwin. I received the invitation to present from the Department for Education.

I also attended the DAWN Forum, which was held from Monday 1<sup>st</sup>-Tuesday 2<sup>nd</sup> of September 2025. I was invited by the Aboriginal Workforce Initiatives Team, Department for Education to present work on the Ngarrindjeri language at the event as part of the Spotlight Series. DAWN is the Department's Aboriginal Workforce Network.

I thoroughly enjoyed participating in and presenting at the international and state conferences. I have gained a wealth of knowledge, skills and experience from each conference. Attending the events and engaging with other language specialists from around the state, nationally and internationally has strengthened my professional networks and has enhanced my practice.

It was an amazing feeling to be surrounded by language specialists from around the nation and across the world who are passionate and committed to the continuity of First Nations languages. The conferences and experiences were valuable cultural and educational opportunities and has enhanced my professional development. The events were insightful, informative, engaging and inspirational. I look forward to assisting in the maintenance, revival and continuity of Ngarrindjeri language and culture.






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Procedure text written by the Year 1/2 class outlining the steps of making fairy bread.






