I am extremely proud of the work of our students, staff, and families over the 2025 year.

Firstly, Teaching & Learning, as a staff we have developed our school learning plan over the year. In November we reviewed the goals.

Goal 1: Wellbeing - improve student sense of belonging and resilience. Our Wellbeing & Engagement data showed improvement in happiness and connectedness indicating that our work with the Berry Street Education Model that provides a framework for consistent approaches for a calm learning environment is progressing.

Goal 2: Effective Learners – improve student metacognition through feedback strategies. The Wellbeing & Engagement data showed significant improvement in cognitive engagement and academic self – concept which is encouraging.

We will continue to work on these goals in 2026.

2025 saw the introduction of "Student Led Conferences" changing the emphasis from adults talking to students talking and leading meetings with teachers and parents. The survey results from students, families and teachers were very positive. Governing Council has approved these conferences occurring on one day in 2026. Lessons will be suspended, and students attend for their conference. This will allow teachers to be focused on the conferences. They will be held Term 2, Week 2, Wednesday.

Staff and Governing Council also finalised a

Homework guideline. This is a guide for teachers, students, and families. We are keen to use the guideline and the Homework Club more in 2026 for students to consolidate learning and take responsibility for meeting due dates. In 2026 we will also be providing guidance for students on the use of AI. The Department for Education has developed "EdChat," a safer platform for students to learn to use AI as a tool.

2025 also saw the restructure of the Student Representative Council with the appointment of one secondary school captain and one primary school captain. This has reinvigorated the SRC with greater engagement from the primary members. The Council have run many events over the year with secondary students working with primary students consolidating peer relationships between the primary and secondary. Thank you to Prue Boland Assistant Principal Wellbeing and Millie Cunneen and Mya Kartinyeri - our school captains for leading the council.





We did have feedback from families that our communication is still not meeting needs. We have plenty of communication (Edsmart, Community Portal, FROG, Facebook, Newsletters, Noticeboard) but I suspect the concerns are around which communication is used for what purpose and helping families navigate this. FROG Journals will provide a way to communicate students learning with families in a confidential way. This will also be useful for students as the Social Media ban comes into effect. We will do more work on communication to help families stay connected in 2026.

A highlight of the year was the Kids in Space performance. The staff and students had great fun preparing for and presenting the performance. The year 7's shone in their roles with the primary classes enhancing the performance. Congratulations to all involved. Similarly, students in the Festival of Music choir and band revelled in their performances. The band performance in Murray Bridge was joyful to watch as the students improvised with their great teachers Mr. Helps and Mr. Frears. Once again, thank you to our instrumental music teachers for your commitment to regional students in the arts.

A vast array of student work was showcased at the Coonalpyn Show with many students taking out awards. In the inaugural school challenge "decathlon" Meningie Area School took out the event scoring 68/80 points, including first in the Principal Photo section.

Moving into 2026 we have successfully recruited and will welcome three new teachers to consolidate our teaching teams. In an exciting development the Limestone Coast Technical College is opening. Six year 10's and one year 11 will access vocational courses at the LCTC to personalize their learning plans.

This time of year, brings endings. I would like to congratulate Wendy VanDenBrink on her long service at Meningie Area School. She has provided outstanding support for our students but is also a strong advocate for the school and that Meningie Area School and regional schools can provide an education that can take students anywhere. We will also farewell Matt Lillis and Kelsey Tynan. Matt is returning to Adelaide to take up a position with the SANFL and Kelsey has taken a position in Victoria. Thank you both for your work and we wish you well in your new positions.

In closing I would like to thank the Governing Council for the work they have done throughout the year. They provide connection between families and the school to ensure the school truly reflects the values and needs of the students. It would be great to see some more new members in 2026, please consider nominating for the council.

I hope you all enjoyed the celebration of our students work over 2025. We look forward to continuing this work in 2026. I hope that everyone in our school community has a relaxed break filled with fun, family, and friends.








9/10 ROAD SCIENCE TERM 4

Task: what did you learn about road science? Why do we have reduced speed limits in school zones?



Road Science:

During semester 2, Term 4, we have learned about road science. I have learned many things about road science, such as calculating speed, velocity, inertia and stopping distances. A car is moving at 80 km/h, and the passengers inside the vehicle are also moving at 80 km/h, however when a force interferes to stop the vehicle, the passengers inside continue to move at that speed. This is called inertia. Inertia can depend on the mass of the vehicle, for example a bus has more mass than a car, therefore the bus has more momentum than the car.

This is why seatbelts are necessary, as they help to stop the force of the passengers when the vehicle stops. This supports the passengers, and ensures they don't get severely harmed, initially saving their lives. Wear seatbelts, it's really not that hard.

When a car is moving fast, such as 60 km/h, the car will keep moving, even after they press the brake pedal, as it will take longer to slow down and stop. Whilst, if a car is travelling at a slower speed such as 25 km/h the stopping distance will be shorter. The speed zones are different around schools, so that cars and vehicles will travel at a slower speed when children are around, and if they were to suddenly stop, their stopping distance will be short, and this will help to keep the children of the school, and the driver safe and protected.

What have you learned about road science?

I have learned about speed, time, stopping distance and how to graph the average stopping distances and average speeds. This includes the results for slow, medium and fast.

Why are seat belts compulsory?

Seat belts are compulsory, because it's a safety reason. Seat belts can save you, if you crash.

Why speed zones are different around schools?

Speed zones are different around schools because kids cross and if you're doing 50km per hour, you don't have time to brake.






9/10 SCIENCE TERM 4

- 2. and "impact of concentration on reaction time" Students found as concentration decreased, reaction time increased.
















AUSSIE & BACON




